Minister's letter

Dear friends,

Promises, promises...

Dear friends,

I wonder how you feel about making promises? I also wonder how you feel when they are broken...

It was wonderful at the beginning of September to welcome three new members into our church and to hear their stories of faith. Together they promised to remain faithful to God through the life and body of our church family. Together *we* promised to support and uphold them in this journey. It is the same as the promises at a baptism, where the congregation is asked:

'Will you so maintain the Church's life of worship and service that they may grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of God and of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord?'

Our response is that with God's help we will. Together we are to create an environment where all can grow in grace and faith through worship and service. But this only follows a declaration of the truths of the faith are declared: that Jesus came into the world to live and show God's love, that he died and was raised from death... "All this for you."

The contract starts with God. It is God who has promised us an eternal relationship with him, who showed us the way to live through his son Jesus Christ and who guides and supports us through the power of the Holy Spirit. This day, and every day. His promise doesn't change or falter. "All this for you."

At our first fellowship group meeting looking at the Covenant Prayer, we began by remembering that this commitment comes because God made all his promises first. We began thinking about all the promises in the bible that mean something to us.

- 'I will make a new covenant...' (Jeremiah 31.31ff)
- 'I will be with you always, to the end of the age.' (Matthew 28.20)
- 'The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want.' (Psalm 23.1)
- 'Where two or three are gathered, I shall be there also.' (Matthew 18.20)
- 'Those who wait on the Lord will renew their strength...' (Isaiah 40.31)

We humans are less good at keeping promises! It is so easy to promise things off the cuff ("I'll call her when I get home...") and then not keep our word - often through forgetfulness rather than illintent. We stand in commitment and support at baptisms, and then assume it is someone else's job. How often God must look at us with sad eyes, as we let him down again. How gracious is the love of God that forgives us, day in, day out, and offers us a clean slate to start again.

As a church we are looking at our mission. We want to see our church grow, but our main aim is to share that all-encompassing love of God with everyone. As we look at our strengths and weaknesses, opportunities and threats, so we also rely on the promises of God in our lives. Can we take a step of faith? Can we be bold in our plans for the future? Can we dream dreams, and voice visions, so that we see God in action in our community?



We started on 2013 in Chelwood Baptist Church and before long, the Foodbank started developing a life of its own, providing essential food items and cash. During the last 12 months we have issued 2,700 food parcels, opened three days a week for food collections and supported 4,350 adults and 2,553 children
